Strategic Priorities



This is an exciting time for the City of Lynnwood! Development in and around our City Center is picking up speed, Sound Transit will begin construction of the Lynnwood Link very soon, and our community is growing and changing.

The City Council and I have been working with our Finance team to improve our City's financial health, providing us with a solid foundation. We have an adopted Community Vision and numerous adopted plans that illustrate how we want Lynnwood to be in the future. And now the question is...how do we get there?

Over the next five years we will continue to see rapid change, and the way we prepare and respond to that change, will forever impact our community. Last fall, our Executive Leadership team participated in a 10-session Change Management Course and is now in the process of developing a Five-Year Strategic Plan to further crystallize our future.

We have developed five priority areas that will help us to be laser-focused on the projects and initiatives that will set us up for success. Those priorities are:

- **Priority 1: Fulfill the community vision for the City Center and Lynnwood Link light rail**
- **Priority 2: Ensure financial stability and economic success**
- **Priority 3: Nurture operational and organizational excellence**
- **Priority 4: Be a safe, welcoming, and livable city**
- **Priority 5: Pursue and maintain collaborative relationships and partnerships**

This Five-Year Strategic Plan will include objectives and goals in support of the priority areas. All of this work will directly shape how we budget and how we align our City's resources. I look forward to sharing with you our Five-Year Strategic Plan as it develops.

2018 Legislative Priorities

The City of Lynnwood is proactively engaging with our State Legislators to advocate and convey our City's legislative priorities. Many decisions that are made in Olympia have direct or indirect impacts on our City's ability to provide services to the people of Lynnwood. When our representatives know our City priorities, they are better equipped to represent our interests in Olympia.

In January, Lynnwood Officials traveled to Olympia for the Association of Washington Cities—City Action Days. During the visit, our delegation met with Lieutenant Governor Cyrus Habib, Senators Marilyn Chase and Marko Liias, and Representatives Ruth Kagi, Lillian Ortiz-Self, Strom Petersen, and Cindy Ryu. Here are examples of a few of Lynnwood's Top Legislative Priorities:

- *Fund the Sound Transit Lynnwood Link Extension.*
- *Support planning and funding solutions for chokepoint and congestion relief in alignment with transportation priorities of Lynnwood and the region such as the Poplar Way Extension Bridge over I-5.*
- *Improve and expand transportation programs through state and federal funding grants.*
- *Protect and keep the level of state-shared revenues provided to local governments.*
- *Improve the mental health system & mental health field response.*
- *Support efforts that provide appropriate funding and authority to address growing mental health, homelessness, and affordable housing crises led by cities, counties, and the Low-Income Housing Alliance.*
- *Ensure adequate funding of grant programs to enhance public health that help youth and adults live active and healthy lifestyles.*
- *Provide local government with financing tools to fund public infrastructure needed for economic development and community revitalization such as the Lynnwood City Center.*
- *Fund the state sales tax incentive and support annexation assistance programs consistent with the Growth Management Act.*

Summit Strategies will continue to further represent and advocate before U.S. Congress Lynnwood's transportation and infrastructure priorities, and work closely with the Washington State Congressional delegation to advance those priorities.

Lynnwood uses a Budgeting For Outcomes (BFO) process to ensure budget decisions fully align with community expectations. 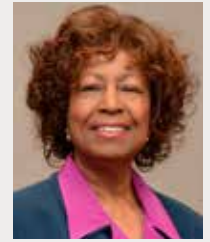

This Summit marks the start of 2018 and the start of our second ever, Budgeting for Outcomes (BFO) biennial budget for our City. Major Infrastructure Projects Coming Soon

Starting this spring, construction will begin on several major projects in and around Lynnwood. Although a short term inconvenience, these major infrastructure projects will greatly improve road conditions and prepare our City for the future.

Ash Way/Maple Road Flood Improvements

This Snohomish County lead project will ease flooding in the vicinity of Maple Road and Ash Way near the Interurban Trail. This project will raise the intersection approximately 5ft and greatly improve the drainage system's capacity to reduce upstream flooding.

Ash Way and Maple Road Intersection will be closed during construction with marked detour routes. Construction begins this Spring. Sign up for project alerts from Snohomish County at www.snohomishcountywa.gov/3677/Maple-Rd-and-Ash-Way-Lynnwood-2018.

Interurban Trail Missing Link

This project will complete a "missing link" in the Interurban Trail by providing a continuous Class I bicycle/pedestrian corridor that is separated from traffic and/or located in the Interurban (PUD) corridor. 212th St SW will have periodic closures and marked detour routes. Construction begins this Spring.

36th Ave W Improvement Project

In addition to road surface improvements, this two-mile long corridor will add sidewalks, landscape beautification, additional lanes in certain areas, bicycle lanes, a new traffic signal and Lynnwood's second roundabout. Construction begins this summer.

2018 Paving Program

The City will be using chip sealing technology to preserve our roads at selected locations citywide. Construction starting in April 2018.

Sound Transit Early Demo

Design of the Lynnwood Link Extension and the Lynnwood City Center station is underway. Completion of the design is expected by the end of 2018.

196th St SW Improvement Project

The project will add two additional lanes, a center median, wider sidewalks, and landscape features with a boulevard appearance. It will help accommodate growth in our City Center and create an enhanced pedestrian environment. Construction will begin early 2019.

Sewer & Lift Station Improvements

Lift Station 4 and 8, both located near Alderwood Mall, will have significant improvements to allow for increased capacity, as well as additional sewer mains connecting them to Lift Station 10.

Alderwood Mall Parkway and Alderwood Mall Boulevard will have periodic closures and marked detour routes. Construction begins this spring.
