He stated he would want to review the ordinance on this type of tax exemption before he will support it again. Motion Passed: 6 - 0

1. CALL TO ORDER

2. ROLL CALL

Also present were Finance Director Michelle Meyer, Strategic Planner Corbitt Loch and Accounting Manager Janella Lewis.

3. FINANCIAL REPORTS

- 3.A Review of 2020 Year-end financial report
 - Finance Director Meyer reviewed activity from 2020 act. The City Council had originally authorized transferring up to \$2M from Reserves to cover shortfalls but Finance only had to transfer \$1.129M, which she said is very encouraging.
 - Rolling all general funds together, the city is short by \$500k of the 2.5 month reserves required.
 - In 2020 sales tax revenue dipped very low in the spring, but is now bouncing back. Revenues to-date are very strong.
 - Delinquent Utility accounts are a concern, but are not having a huge impact on total revenues.
 - Compared to the COVID-19 forecast, actual revenues over performed versus the forecast.
 - All departments stayed within their Covid revised budgets.
 - The city lost a lot of revenue with recreation class cancellations. There is expected to be a way to recover revenues in the American Rescue Plan Act.

4. DISCUSSION ITEMS

- 4.A Review of February and March 2021 Sales Tax Revenues
 Director Meyer shared a comparison of 20 vs 21 sales tax revenues. She
 pointed out a huge dip in March, 2020 when COVID began. Year-to-date
 sales tax revenues through March were higher than the same time in 2020
 and 2019.
- 4.B Update on 2020 Annual Report and Audit Director Meyer stated that the team got the basic financial statements done in time for the bond issuance, but the full annual comprehensive report is not yet complete. She will be scheduling the auditors to come and speak to council for the 2020 financial audit entrance conference
- 4.C Update on CJC Bond Issuance
 Director Meyer stated that the city had a good call with the rating agency. They
 have affirmed the AA+ rating and interest rates are still very low so a competitive
 sale is expected on June 2, 2021 with funds to be received on June 24, 2021.
- 4.D Discuss participation in Snohomish County Investment Pool Director Meyer shared information about the Snohomish County Investment Pool, which the city can contribute to and earn higher interest than current longer-term investments or the State pool can offer. The Council Finance Team was supportive of moving ahead with joining the pool. The next time the financial policy is updated, this will be incorporated.
- 4.E Update on American Rescue Plan Act funding

Director Meyer shared that she has attended several conference calls about the American Rescue Plan Act and is still waiting for final information. The American Rescue plan is being referred to as a "once in a generation" act. It is meant to have a long-term impact. The City of Lynnwood is rated as a smaller unit of government (non-entitlement) based on population size, so we have to wait until the larger cities have their funding.

Director Meyer is estimating that the city will get approximately \$8.52 MM over two years- half this year and half next year. We get our money 30 - 60 days after the state receives it. It will be managed by the OFM (Office of Financial Management) for the state. Changes to the program can still be made until the "Final Rule" is issued after July 16, 2021.

Rescue Funds are expected to cover costs starting March 3, 2021 and must be obligated by December 31, 2024 with the period of performance ending no later than December 21,2026. Eligible uses include:

- Respond to public health emergency and negative economic impacts
- Revenue loss (General Fund only, based on a formula. Under Interim rules, cannot be used to directly reimburse a utility fund but this may change
- Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure
- Expanded uses for hardest hit communities in Qualified Census Tracts

From what she has learned thus far, the act does not allow for coverage of utility revenue loss.

Meyer recommended that the committee keep this on the agenda for the next few months until we have the full set of rules and can bring it to the full council. Next month she will also have April tax revenues, bond sale and audit information.

2. Oath of Office

2.A Oath of Office - Council Position #2

Judge Stephen Moore administered the oath of office to Patrick Decker for position 2 on the council. Mr. Decker thanked the council and spoke about his hopes in serving the community. Mayor Smith asked that roll call be amended to include Mr. Decker.

3. Work Session Item

- 3.A Briefing: Regional Growth Center Subarea Planning
 Community Planning Manager Ashley Winchell and City Center Program
 Manager Karl Almgren provided a briefing on the Regional Growth Center and
 addressed the sub-area planning. Winchell explained that this plan is in concert
 with all of the regional plans for growth and transit. Almgren discussed the details
 of the ST3 projects. Council members were given the opportunity to ask
 questions and make comments.
- 3.B Discussion: New drug possession laws

 Chief James Nelson provided an overview of the recent changes to state law

regarding the possession of drugs. A recent court ruling led to the changes. An ordinance will come forward at the next work session to adopt the new state statutes by reference.

3.C Briefing No. 4/6: Transportation; Operations and Maintenance Update Director Bill Franz, Manager Jared Bond, and Supervisor Rus Kroshko provided a briefing and discussion of the status of transportation with a focus on the operations and maintenance of streets in the city. The team shared the status of the department and scope of work. The budget has not kept up with the rest of the city budget and staff size is smaller than in 1991.

Council members asked questions and made comments. Council Vice President asked them to look at 10 and 15 years ago what the budget looked like in today's dollars. Councilmember Altamirano-Crosby suggested that they send out the job opportunities to the BIPOC community in Spanish and other languages. There are a lot of people who want to work which could help fill the positions they have not been able to fill.

- 3. Work Session Item
 - 3.A Briefing: Comprehensive Plan 2021 Proposed Amendment List (1 of 3)

Director David Kleitsch introduced Ashley Winchell, AICP, Community Planning Manager and Kristen Holdsworth, AICP, Senior Planner to review proposed amendments to the comprehensive plan. The council is being asked to decide which to be further evaluated out of three proposals. On June 28 there will be a public hearing. Council members asked questions and made comments.

3.B Briefing: Solid Waste Update

Public Works Director Franz provided an introduction regarding the solid waste in Lynnwood. Marcie MacQuarrie, Public Works Manager reviewed history and options for the future. She explained that the City of Lynnwood is currently with the Washington Utilities And Transportation Commission (WUTC), an agency

meant to help smaller cities and annexations manage waste hauler contracts and billing. To leave the WUTC the city is required to give 7 years notice before it can start with a new hauler.

- Leaving would allow the city to contract with a single hauler and have control over customer service issues, programs and discounts, rate structure and green initiatives. It would also allow the city to offer senior, disabled and/or low income discounts which are offered by surrounding communities. Currently Lynnwood has two providers and their services vary. Managing its' own contract would mean the city could have one supplier and more consistent service across the community. Several of the city's surrounding neighbors have left the WUTC to enter into their own contract with waste haulers.
- Leaving the WUTC would require a full time manager, however this salary is worked into the rates charged by the hauler, so it would not cost the City any additional money.

Council members asked questions and made comments. Three members of council agreed that they would like the public works team to continue the exploration into leaving the WUTC.

3.C Discussion: Administrative Leave for Management staff

Council President Hurst stated that he appreciated the mayor being transparent about awarding leave to senior staff. He expressed interest in learning what the council can do for some of the lower-paid staff that have been out in the field during the pandemic. According to his interpertation of the LMC, the city council is authorized to give employee recognition and awards.

Mayor Smith spoke to the reasons why she awarded senior staff administrative leave.

Council members gave comments and asked questions. Suggestions were made on how to move forward. Councilmembers Altamirano-Crosby and Sessions supported Hurst in asking the attorney to investigate options.

4. Mayor Comments and Questions

The Mayor asked council if they would like to adjourn after the executive session. Council agreed unanimously.

5. Council Comments

President Hurst addressed council member Frizzell's email request for action on several issues:

- Discussion of liaison reports is scheduled for the June 14th business meeting. Hurst requested that all council members submit a written report for that meeting and prepare to give a brief description at the meeting.
- Return to chambers for council meetings is currently planned for returning in July in some fashion. Per the mayor, it will be approved if the governor flips the switch to reopen.
- Reinstating the budget to include travel for council members would require a budget amendment which is typically done at year end.
- Hurst asked for an explanation from Frizzell regarding her statement about council member premiums and insurance for family members. Frizzell explained that she wanted all council members to be aware that some council members are compensated more than others by having free benefits for their family members. Last year she worked with Finance Director Springer who determined that it would save the city \$73k if council members paid for their family members.
- Council President Hurst announced that he plans to send to council and make a
 motion to forward to the planning commission to review zoning restrictions for
 Cannabis retail stores. He will bring it up on the 14th.
- Council Vice President stated concern that the city has money in the budget for an assistant fire marshall but there is nobody in the position.

Council held an executive session to discuss a potential Real Estate transaction at 8:05 pm.

City of Lynnwood

Recognition of Juneteenth

WHEREAS, in 1619, twenty captured Africans were brought to Virginia as enslaved people, ushering in 246 years of slavery in America; and

WHEREAS, by 1680 as the number of indentured laborers of European descent declined, the enslavement of Africans was widely accepted, and the buying and selling of these human souls became highly profitable in the southern United States; and

WHEREAS, the Emancipation Proclamation of 1863 freed enslaved people in the 11 Confederate states at war against the Union; however, it wasn't until December of 1865 when Congress required the Confederate states to ratify the 13th Amendment, thereby abolishing chattel slavery and involuntary servitude; and

WHEREAS, slavery remained relatively unaffected in Texas until June 19th, 1865 when Union troops arrived in Galveston, Texas to take control of the state and freed all enslaved people; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth is a commemoration of June 19th, 1865, and is now celebrated in many communities in the United States with cookouts, parades, prayer services, and poetry readings; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth is a time to reflect on the injustice endured by the men, women, and children of African descent brought to this nation against their will, but whose legacy of determination to live free paved the way for our continued fight for justice; and

WHEREAS, on June 19th the City of Lynnwood will honor the legacy of Black and African American ancestors by continuing our commitment to cultivate a community where all are included, valued and welcome; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that I, Mayor Nicola Smith, and the Lynnwood City Council, hereby proclaim Saturday, June 19, 2021 as Juneteenth in the City of Lynnwood, and we encourage everyone to celebrate Juneteenth by strengthening our resolve to dismantle systemic racism, denounce hatred and bigotry and renew our pledge to eradicate racial inequity and social injustice in our communities and throughout the world.

BACKGROUND:

The Lynnwood Municipal Code (LMC) provides a process for annual consideration of amendments to the City's Comprehensive Plan (Chapter 18.04 LMC). The Development and Business Services Department (DBS) compiles and maintains for public review the Proposed Amendment List (PAL). This year, there are three proposed amendments that have been placed on the PAL for consideration.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL ACTIONS:

The June 7, 2021, City Council received a briefing on the 2021 Comprehensive Plan amendments. The proposals help implement Lynnwood's Housing Action Plan, which was adopted by Resolution 2021-05 on May 24, 2021.

Summary

At the upcoming meeting the City Council will hold a public meeting to finalize the 2021 Comprehensive Plan docket (determine which of the proposed amendments should be further evaluated). On June 7, 2021, staff provided a briefing at the City Council meeting. Please refer to the June 7, 2021 meeting materials for additional information about the annual Comprehensive Plan amendment process and the three proposals received.

The City is in Phase 1 of the annual Comprehensive Plan Amendment Process. Phase 2 (staff evaluation) will commence after Council finalizes the docket. Phase 3 (final review and action on the proposed Comprehensive Plan amendments) will occur in Fall 2021.

Previous City Council Action

On June 7, 2021, DBS staff presented a briefing to City Council. The proposals help implement Lynnwood's Housing Action Plan, which was adopted by Resolution 2021-05 on May 24, 2021.

Follow-Up to Council Questions at Briefing

At the June 7, 2021 briefing, staff committed to providing additional information to several Council questions. Council questions were in two primary categories:

1) Procedural and 2) Specific to proposals. Answers to the procedural questions are provided below. Staff will research and provide answers to the questions specific to proposals if Council places the items on the docket for further evaluation.

Answers to Procedural Questions

2. Why is the policy language different for the Highway 99 subarea compared to the College District?

The contents are substantively the same, but they are formatted differently due to each report's organization. The Highway 99 Subarea Plan includes Goals, Policies, and Supporting Recommendations (with descriptions). The College District Subarea Plan is written as a narrative without a structure of goals, policies, and supporting recommendations.

Specifically, there was a question regarding the last sentence of the proposed text amendment in the College District Subarea Plan. This language is included as Supporting Recommendation 3.3.1 in the Highway 99 Subarea Plan. The highlighted text, below, shows where the language is located for each of the proposed text amendments.

College District Subarea Plan Proposed Text:

The College District Plan subarea is intended for a variety of housing types and levels of affordability, including income-restricted and subsidized multifamily housing units. The City regulates the construction of housing but does not directly build housing. The City will serve as a partner to encourage housing that meets the diverse housing needs of the community. The City will work with housing providers to create and preserve affordable housing serving households at 80% area median income (AMI) or below.

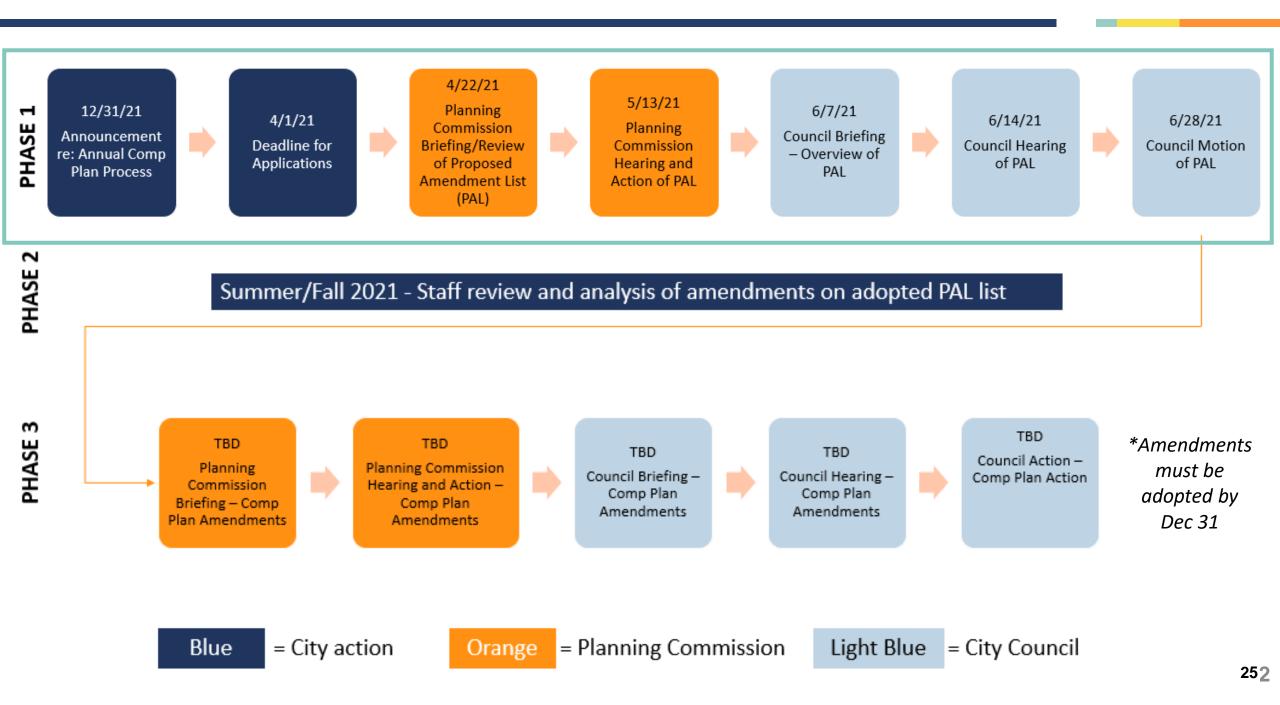

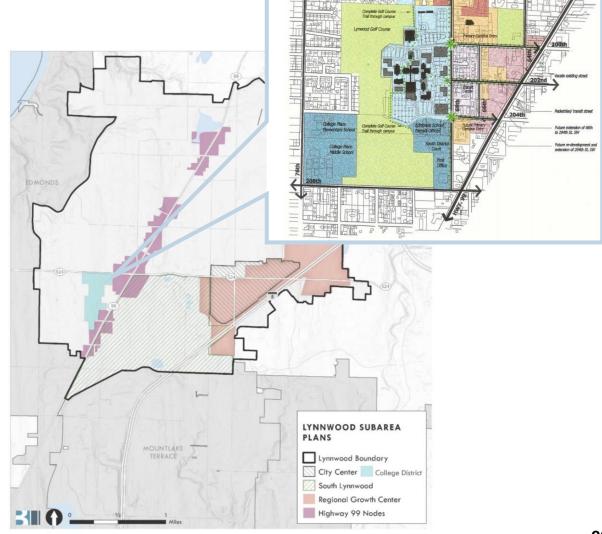

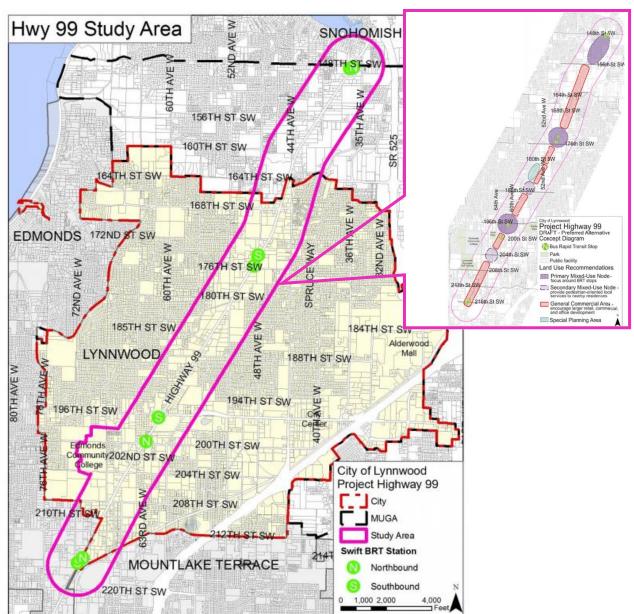

The proposed Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) which includes the Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) covers the next six years, 2022-2027. The projects are derived directly from the prior CFP, 2021-2026, with minor modifications. New projects are also added. All the projects are based on policies set forth in the City of Lynnwood Comprehensive Plan. Having an adopted Six-Year CFP and TIP allows the City of Lynnwood to compete for federal and state grants and to meet other state and/or federal requirements.

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Consistent with RCW 35.77.010 and RCW 36.81.121, the TIP identifies the transportation projects (a subset of the CFP) and must be adopted yearly by the City Council. The TIP is combined with the CFP to simplify the process.

The Planning Commission reviewed the proposed CFP on April 22, 2021 and they made a recommendation of approval and forwarded to the City Council for review and adoption. 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Introduction

This Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) is an inventory of capital projects organized by Department/Program and consists of the following sections:

- Administrative Services Information Services
- Park, Recreation & Cultural Arts Administration
 - Building & Property Services
 - o Parks & Recreation
- Police Administration
- Public Works Administration
 - o Building & Property Services
 - Street Projects
 - Utility Projects Enterprise Funds
 - Sewer
 - Stormwater
 - Water

The Streets projects of CFP are the transportation related projects of Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Utility Projects are Enterprise Funds and have a dedicated funding source. Since these projects are all managed by the Public Works Department they are grouped by element (i.e. Water, Sewer, and Stormwater).

WHAT ARE CAPITAL FACILITIES AND WHY DO WE NEED TO PLAN FOR THEM?

Capital facilities are all around us. They are the public facilities we all use on a daily basis. They are our public streets and transportation facilities, our City parks and recreation facilities, our public buildings such as libraries and community centers, our public water systems that bring us pure drinking water, and the sanitary sewer systems that collect our wastewater for treatment and safe disposal. Even if you don't reside within the City, you use our capital facilities every time you drive, eat, shop, work, or play here.

While a Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) does not cover routine maintenance, it does include renovation, major repair or reconstruction of damaged or deteriorating facilities. While capital facilities do not usually include furniture and equipment, a capital project may include the furniture and equipment associated with a newly constructed or renovated facility. Our CFP also includes the acquisition of major computer systems and personal computers, etc. Capital improvements that are included in the CFP are generally defined as those with a cost more than \$100,000 and with a useful life of at least five years. The CFP may also identify expenditures less than \$100,000 that are considered significant or may be necessary to meet distinct regulatory requirements.

All of these facilities must be planned for years in advance to assure that they will be available and adequate to serve all who need or desire to utilize them. Such planning involves determining, not only where the facilities will be needed, but when; and not only how much they will cost, but how they will be paid for.

The planning period for a CFP is six years. The adoption of the CFP does not include specific appropriation of funds. Such appropriation will come subsequently, by specific Council action and adoption of budget.

The CFP is an important link between the City's planning and budgetary processes, allowing us to determine the projects that are needed to achieve the goals of the Comprehensive Plan and assuring that we will have adequate funds to undertake these projects. It is an integral component of the City's twenty-year Comprehensive Plan and directly related to growth management implementation. New information and priorities are continually reviewed and annual amendments to the CFP must maintain consistency with all other elements of the Comprehensive Plan.

THE STATE GROWTH MANAGEMENT ACT, AND ITS EFFECT ON THE CAPITAL FACILITIES PLANNING PROCESS

In 1990, in response to the effect of unprecedented population growth and pressure on our State's environment and public facilities, the Washington State Legislature determined that "uncoordinated and unplanned growth, together with a lack of common goals expressing the public's interest in the conservation and the wise use of our lands, pose a threat to the environment, sustainable economic

development, and the health, safety, and the high quality of life enjoyed by the residents of this state." Further they found that "it is in the public interest that citizens, communities, local governments, and the private sector to cooperate and coordinate with one another in comprehensive land use planning." The State of Washington Growth Management Act (GMA) was adopted by the Legislature in that year to address its concerns.

The GMA requires the City of Lynnwood and other high growth cities and counties to write, adopt and implement local comprehensive plans that will guide all development activity within their jurisdictions and associated Urban Growth Areas (UGA) over the next twenty years. Each jurisdiction is required to coordinate its comprehensive plan with the plans of neighboring jurisdictions, and unincorporated areas located within designated Urban Growth Areas must be planned through a joint process involving both the city and the county.

The GMA requires that comprehensive plans guide growth and development in a manner that is consistent with the following State planning goals:

- 1) Urban growth. Encourage development in urban areas where adequate public facilities and services exist or can be provided in an efficient manner.
- 2) Reduce sprawl. Reduce the inappropriate conversion of undeveloped land into sprawling, low-density development.
- 3) Transportation. Encourage efficient multimodal transportation systems that are based on regional priorities and coordinated with county and city comprehensive plans.
- 4) Housing. Encourage the availability of affordable housing to all economic segments of the population of this state, promote a variety of residential densities and housing types, and encourage preservation of existing housing stock.
- 5) Economic Development. Encourage economic development throughout the state that is consistent with adopted comprehensive plans, promote economic opportunity for all citizens of this state, especially for unemployed and for disadvantaged persons, promote the retention and expansion of existing businesses and recruitment of new businesses, recognize regional differences impacting

economic development opportunities, and encourage growth in areas experiencing insufficient economic growth, all within the capacities of the state's natural resources, public services, and public facilities.

- 6) Property rights. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation having been made. The property rights of landowners shall be protected from arbitrary and discriminatory actions.
- 7) Permits. Applications for both state and local government permits should be processed in a timely and fair manner to ensure predictability.
- 8) Natural resource industries. Maintain and enhance natural resource-based industries, including productive timber, agricultural, and fisheries industries. Encourage the conservation of productive forest lands and productive agricultural lands and discourage incompatible uses.
- 9) Open space and recreation. Retain open space, enhance recreational opportunities, conserve fish and wildlife habitat, increase access to natural resource lands and water, and develop parks and recreation facilities.
- 10) Environment. Protect the environment and enhance the state's high quality of life, including air and water quality, and the availability of water.
- 11) Citizen participation and coordination. Encourage the involvement of citizens in the planning process and ensure coordination between communities and jurisdictions to reconcile conflicts.
- 12) Public facilities and services. Ensure that those public facilities and services necessary to support development shall be adequate to serve the development at the time the development is available for occupancy and use without decreasing current service levels below locally established minimum standards.
- 13) Historic preservation. Identify and encourage the preservation of lands, sites, and structures that have historical or archaeological significance.

I. THIS CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN AS AN ELEMENT IN LYNNWOOD'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Growth Management Act requires inclusion of seven mandatory planning elements in each jurisdiction's comprehensive plan and suggests the inclusion of several optional elements. The mandatory elements are:

- 1) A capital facilities element, with a six-year plan for financing identified capital needs.
- 2) A land use element.
- 3) A housing element.
- 4) A utilities element.
- 5) A transportation element.
- 6) An economic development element.
- 7) A parks and recreation element.

Lynnwood's adopted Comprehensive Plan also includes elements for Cultural and Historic Resources, Environmental Resources, and Implementation.

II. CONCURRENCY AND LEVELS-OF-SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

The Growth Management Act requires jurisdictions to have capital facilities in place and readily available when new development occurs or a service area population grows. This concept is known as concurrency. Specifically, this means that:

- 1) All public facilities needed to serve new development and/or a growing service area population must be in place at the time of initial need. If the facilities are not in place, a financial commitment must have been made to provide the facilities within six years of the time of the initial need; and
- 2) Such facilities must be of sufficient capacity to serve the service area population without decreasing service levels below locally established minimum levels, known as levels-of-service.

Levels-of-service are quantifiable measures of capacity, such as acres of parkland per capita, vehicle capacity of intersections, or water pressure per square inch available for the water system.

Minimum standards are established at the local level. Factors that influence local standards are citizen, City Council and Planning Commission recommendations, national standards, federal and state mandates, and the standards of neighboring jurisdictions.

The GMA stipulates that if a jurisdiction is unable to provide or finance capital facilities in a manner that meets concurrency and level-of-service requirements, it must either:

- (a) adopt and enforce ordinances which prohibit approval of proposed development if such development would cause levels-of-service to decline below locally established standards, or
- (b) lower established standards for levels-of-service.

III. DETERMINING WHERE, WHEN AND HOW CAPITAL FACILITIES WILL BE BUILT

In planning for future capital facilities, several factors have to be considered. Many are unique to the type of facility being planned. The process used to determine the location of a new park is very different from the process used to determine the location of a new sewer line. Many sources of financing can be used for certain types of projects. Once a project starts then the funding or financing sources will be identified. This capital facilities plan, therefore, is actually the product of many separate but coordinated planning documents, each focusing on a specific type of facility. Future sewer requirements are addressed via a sewer plan; parks facilities through a parks and recreation plan; urban trail facilities through a non-motorized transportation plan; storm drainage facility needs through storm water plans; water facility needs through a water plan; transportation needs through a transportation plan; and information systems through an information technology plan.

In addition, the recommendations of local citizens, the advisory boards, and the Planning Commission are considered when determining types and locations of projects. Some capital needs of the City are not specifically included in a comprehensive plan. Nonetheless, many of these projects are vital to the quality of life in Lynnwood. However, these projects do meet the growth management definition of capital facilities because of the nature of the improvement, its cost or useful life.

IV. CAPITAL FACILITIES NOT PROVIDED BY THE CITY

In addition to planning for public buildings, streets, parks, trails, water systems, sewer systems, and storm drainage systems, the GMA requires that jurisdictions plan for 1) public school facilities, 2) solid waste (garbage) collection and disposal facilities. These facilities are planned for and provided throughout the UGA area by the Edmonds School District and the Snohomish County Department of Solid Waste, respectively. Each county and city must also provide a process for identifying and siting "essential public facilities" within our area. These could include major regional facilities that are needed but difficult to site, such as airports, light rail and bus facilities, state educational facilities, solid-waste handling facilities, substance abuse and mental health facilities, group homes and others. The City of Lynnwood has adopted a common siting process in the City's Comprehensive Plan to guide decision-making on such facilities.

V. FUNDING SOURCES

Capital projects draw funding from many sources, depending on the type of project, the complexity, and the overall cost. For example, a large road improvement project may have 10 or more funding sources that could include, but not be limited to, state and federal grants, City general funds, Real Estate Excise Taxes, Transportation Benefit District Funds, Transportation Impact Fees, City Utility Funds for water, sewer, and/or storm upgrades, private utility contributions, and/or neighboring jurisdiction contributions. The complexity of the funding for large projects is one of the reasons why large capital projects can take many years to move from conception to completion. The following is a list of funding sources that will be used to pay for projects in this plan. Decisions on funding sources have already been made for projects that are funded, partially funded, or budgeted in the current biennium. Future projects are much more speculative to what type of funding will be utilized. Specific information on types of funding for each project is not included in this plan because that information is either more specifically contained in financial plans for each project or in the adopted budget, or the funding sources are not known or too speculative to list.

City General Funds: The City currently contributes general funds towards capital projects via the Capital Development Fund 333. This money can be used for any type of project. The City has also established

the Economic Development Investment Fund (EDIF) that generates dollars from certain development projects that then can be used to reinvest in capital projects that support further economic development. There are requirements established by the program for qualifying for use of these funds.

City Utility Funds: The City's Water, Sewer, and Storm Utility Fund 411 generates customer rates that can be used for capital expenses related to Water, Sewer and Storm improvements. The City has also instituted a sewer connection charge that requires new growth to pay towards capital improvements that their growth requires. All utility projects listed in this plan are funded by these funds.

Real Estate Excise Taxes (REET): The City has implemented REET taxes on the sale of any real property in Lynnwood. These funds must be used pursuant to state law and can fund many types of City projects.

State and Federal Grants: There are various state and federal grant programs that the City must apply and compete for. These generally apply to transportation projects and parks projects, but can also occasionally include other types of projects. These amounts can vary widely, depending on the program. For example, the City received \$14.8 million dollars from the State of Washington towards our 196th Street SW Improvement Project.

Park Impact Fees: The City in 2018 adopted fees that new development must pay towards park needs created by the new demands of their development.

Transportation Impact Fees: The City requires new developments that create additional trips to pay towards transportation projects that mitigate for their new trips.

Transportation Benefit District (TBD): The City formed a TBD that generates funds from sales taxes.

These funds can be used towards transportation capital projects.

Other Jurisdiction Funds: Occasionally a capital projects is shared with or somehow benefits a partner agency. Examples of this could be the Cities of Mountlake Terrace or Edmonds, Snohomish County, Verdant Health District, or our transit agencies. These funds are particular to that project.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN FOR THE CITY OF LYNNWOOD FOR THE PERIOD 2022 THROUGH 2027; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE, SEVERABILITY, AND SUMMARY PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City of Lynnwood has adopted a Comprehensive Plan and has amended it in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW (The Growth Management Act); and

WHEREAS, the Growth Management Act requires a Capital Facilities plan as mandatory element of the City's Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Growth Management Act (RCW 36.70A.130) allows the City to amend the Capital Facilities Element of the Comprehensive Plan concurrently with the adoption of the budget; and

WHEREAS, the Capital Facility Plan provides the six-year capital facility program for the Capital Facilities and Utilities Element of the City's Comprehensive plan;

WHEREAS, the City Council held a public hearing on May 24, 2021 on the Capital Facilities Plan provided for in this ordinance and determined that the Capital Facilities Plan in conjunction with the Capital Facilities and Utilities Elements are consistent with RCW 36.70A.070(3) and the Comprehensive Plan and are desirable and are in the public interest and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Resolution 2003-16 establishing a Capital Project Authorization Process that identifies the approving ordinance (of the Capital Facilities Plan) as a plan of action wherein no final approval to proceed with specific projects is made; Projects defined in the 2022–2027 Capital Facilities Plan requires specific authorization and appropriation by the Council in a subsequent Budget approval, and

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LYNNWOOD, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1: Capital Facilities Plan.</u> That portion of the Comprehensive Plan entitled The Six-Year Capital Facilities Plan (2020-2025): is hereby amended and replaced by "The Six-Year

This funding is scheduled to address a wide variety of technology requests and service enhancements from all departments. Included is funding for:

- Expand wireless network access locations amongst city owned sites.
- Storage Expansion for continued growth and retention

Answer: There were two sets of culverts near the 'Casa Del Rey Condominiums at 195th and Scriber Creek' location. One was replaced a few years ago. Another culvert further downstream needs to be replaced as well. The following project addresses the second culvert.

Replace the existing combination of angled twin 42-inch diameter concrete and CMP culverts with one flow-aligned 12.5-ft wide by 5.5-ft tall precast 3-sided concrete culvert. The inlets and outlets of these culverts are askew from the north-south alignment of the creek, and about halfway across the street, they take a sharp approximate 90-degree bend. Scriber Creek overtops the driveway in a 100-year recurrence interval flood event, endangering motorists and pedestrians and causing flooding damage to adjacent properties and several condominium residences.

The replaced culvert provides a 100-year level of protection from flooding, resulting in improved public safety, increased flow conveyance capacity, improved instream habitat, and improved fish passage.

SB 5476 was recently passed by the state legislature and signed by Governor Inslee. The law took effect immediately. Adoption of those laws involving criminal sanctions will be necessary for local prosecution.

BACKGROUND:

The Washington State Supreme Court's decision in State v. Blake deemed simple felony drug possession statutes as unconstitutional. In response to this the Washington State legislature passed SB 5476 during its 2021 regular session. This bill became law when it was recently signed by Governor Inslee. It took effect immediately. This bill made changes to numerous statutes within Chapter 69, as well as additional chapters of the Revised Code of Washington. The Bill is attached for reference.

This bill again makes possession of a controlled substances illegal, but in most cases it is now a misdemeanor offense. It also adds some conditions prior to the actual charging or arrest of an individual for a drug possession crime. There is now a requirement that individuals who are found to have drugs in their possession be referred for assessment and services at least two times before being arrested or referred for charges. There are many nuances to the new legislation, and its implementation, which Chief Jim Nelson provided to Council on June 1st.

The proposed amended ordinance adopts the new laws that have criminal sanctions as they would be charged by our city prosecutor as misdemeanors.
