

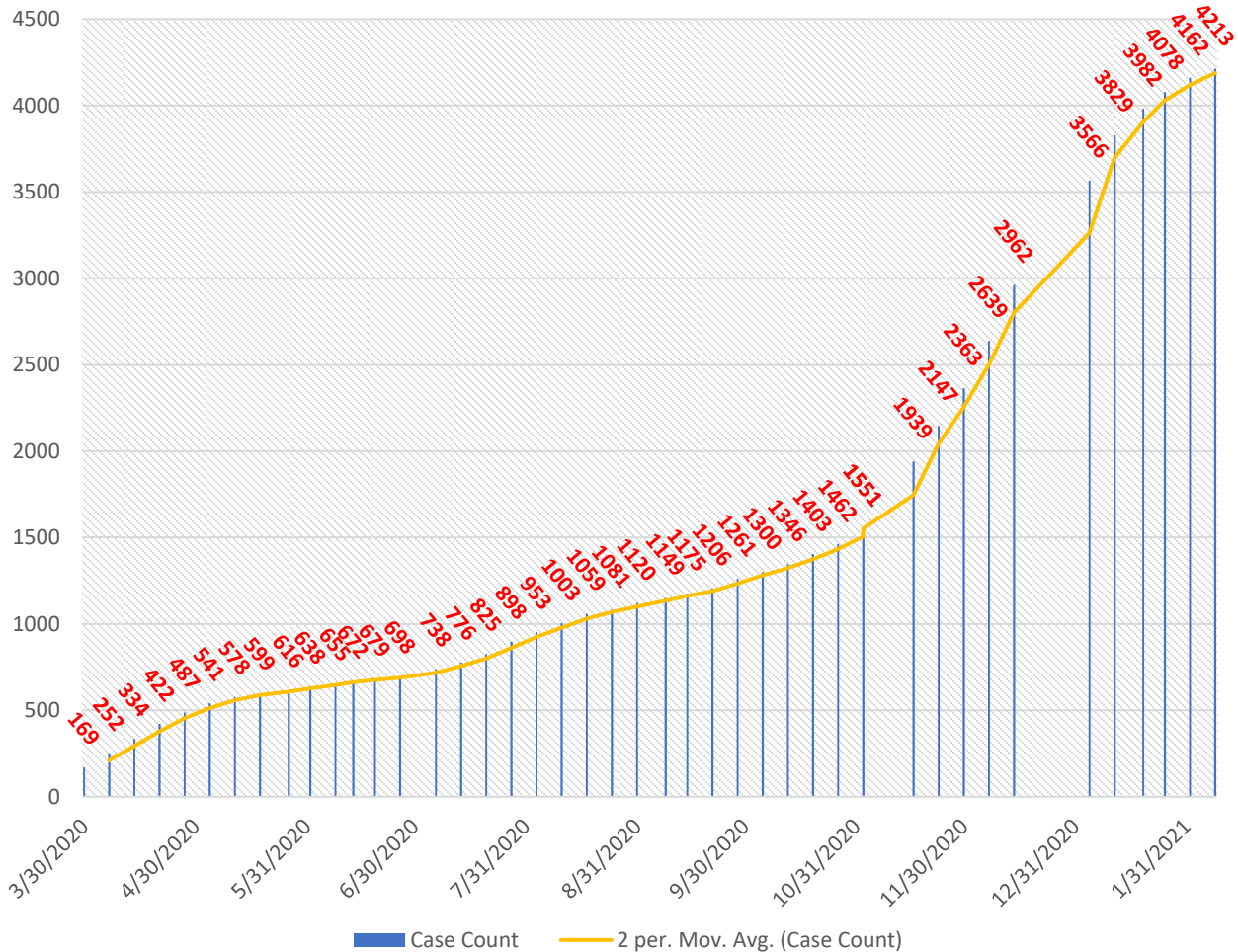
# COVID-19 Council Update

## February 8, 2021

### Current Statistics as of 2/8/2021:

- **Snohomish County** – 29,432 Confirmed/Probable cases (+740 cases from 2/1)
  - 484 Deaths (+7 from 2/1)
  - 1,868 Hospitalizations
  - 38 currently hospitalized with confirmed COVID-19; 7 patients requiring ventilators
  
- **Washington State** – 304,382 Confirmed cases; (+5,284 from 2/1)
  - 4,449 Deaths statewide
  - 18,283 Hospitalizations
  - 1.4% of Deaths/Confirmed Cases
  
- **City of Lynnwood** – 4,213 Cases (+51 from 2/1) – 3,382 recovered
  - 52 Deaths

## Lynnwood Trending

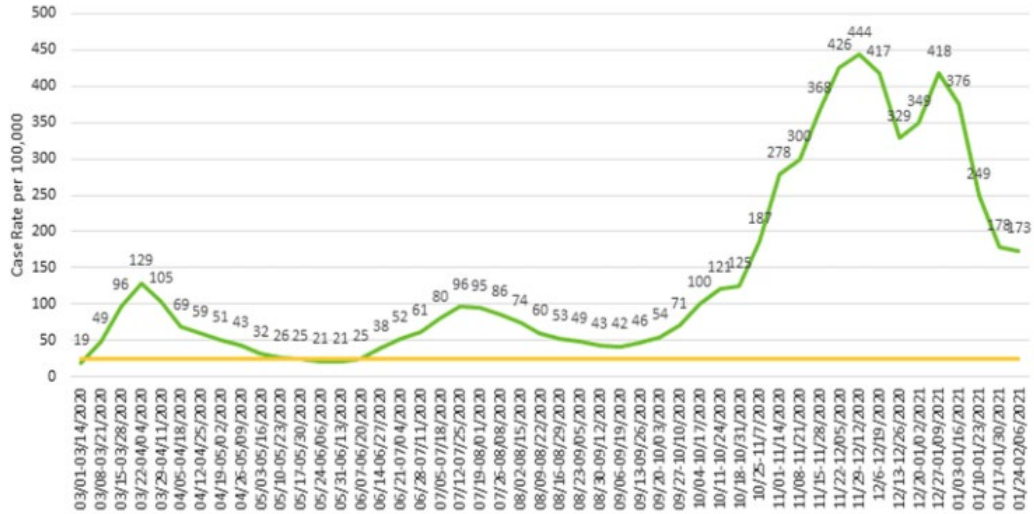

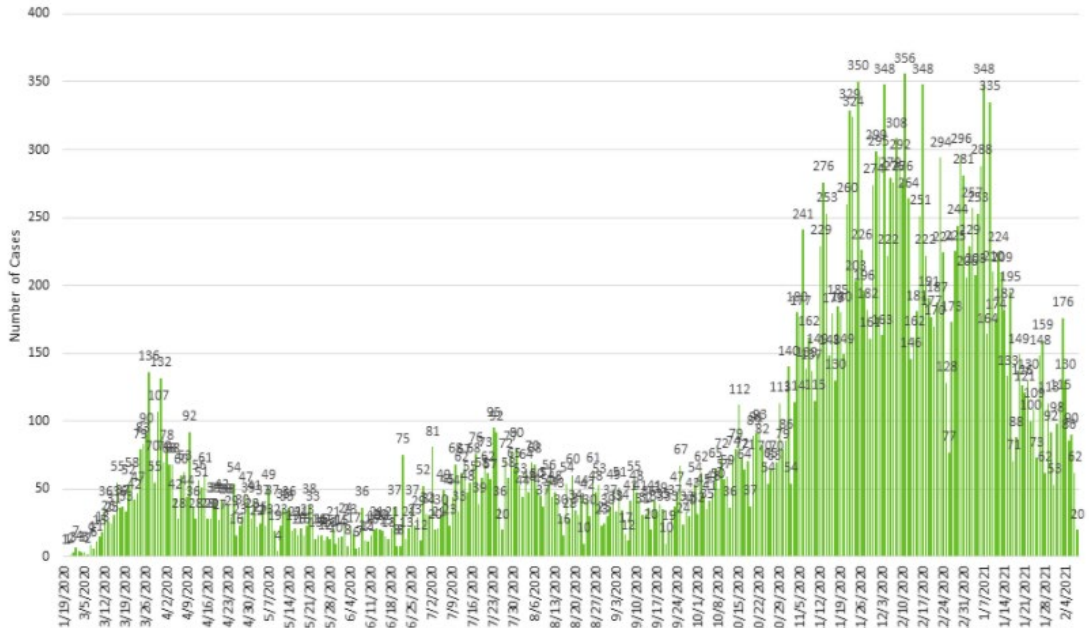
## Status Update:

- COVID Case Update:** Snohomish County's COVID-19 case rates have been declining for a month. We are now at 173 cases per 100,000 population. The three W's are paying off: Wear a Mask; Wash your Hands; Watch your distance.

- Snohomish County Vaccination Update:** There are currently five (5) community mass vaccination sites operating in Snohomish County. The Department of Emergency Management and the Snohomish Health District are actively working on opening a total of seven (7) sites spread throughout the county and servicing patients both in outdoor and indoor formats.

**Snohomish County**

- **Vaccine Allocations in Washington this week:** The state Department of Health offered a glimpse as to how vaccines have been distributed in Washington this past week:
  - 19% community health centers
  - 23% hospitals
  - 36% mass vaccination sites, including the four operated by the state and sites in Snohomish, King and Pierce counties.
  - 19% pharmacies
  - 3% tribes & Urban Indian Health Program

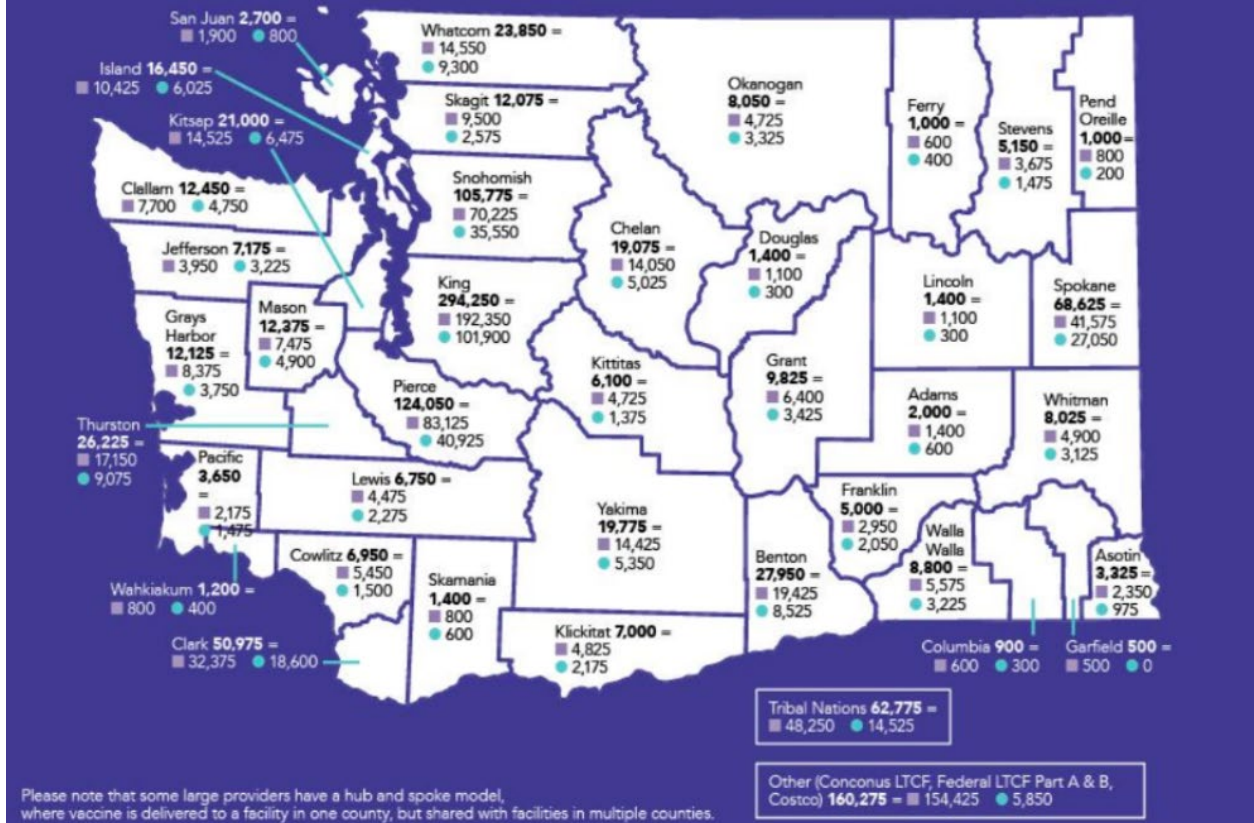
More than 600 facilities in Washington requested more than 358,000 first doses of vaccine. The first-dose allocation from the federal government was 107,125 doses – less than one-third of what providers sought. Total state allocation for second doses was 58,725 – 14,000 less than requested.

In Gov. Inslee’s weekly press conference, he shared additional statistics about the administration of vaccines since mid-December:

- The state has administered over 770,000 doses since vaccinations began; 10% of the state’s population has received at least one dose
- The state is now administering 28,000 doses per day.
- Statewide, there is capacity to administer 45,000 per day, but we do not yet have the vaccine to make this happen
- There are 1.7 million Washingtonians eligible to receive the vaccine right now. On average, the state is receiving 100,000 doses per week.

■ 825,700 Prime Doses ● 343,675 Booster Doses

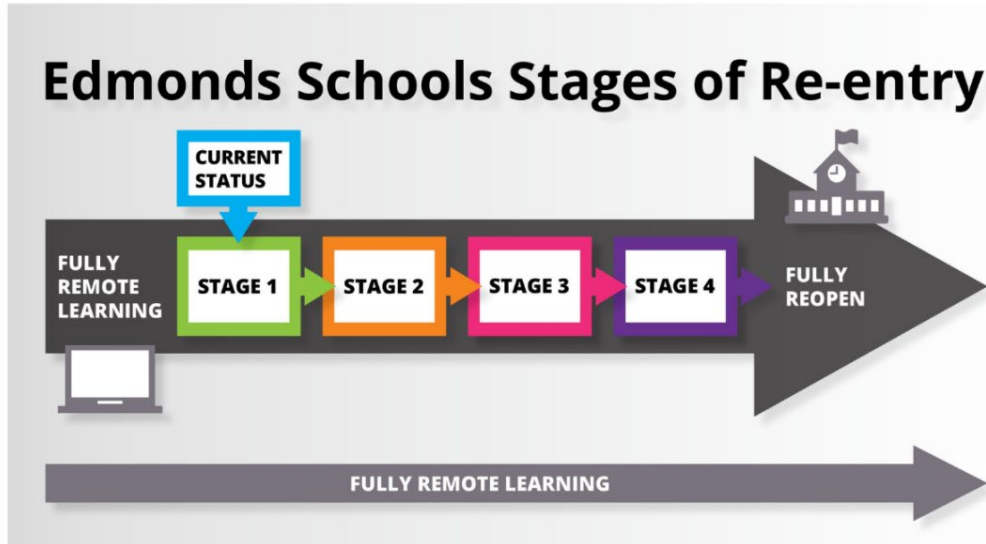


- **Testing Sites:** The Snohomish Health District provides the following drive-through testing sites:

# Stage 2 Re-entry Update



- **Governor Inslee signs bipartisan legislation to help businesses, workers hit by COVID:** Gov. Jay Inslee on Monday signed legislation providing relief for businesses and workers impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. SB 5061 will increase minimum unemployment benefits for workers and provide significant tax relief for businesses over the next five years, to support recovery from the economic impacts of COVID shutdowns. The legislation, which was requested by the governor, is a critical piece of the state's COVID-19 recovery plan. It passed with strong bipartisan support in both chambers.

COVID-19 has caused deep economic hardship for many workers and businesses. This bill, along with other relief we've provided, is another step in helping to mitigate these very difficult impacts.

- **REMINDERS:**

Staying home is still the safest. If you do go out, keep it quick, keep your distance and wear a face covering. Recreate and do business locally to avoid spreading the virus across county lines. Limit the number of people outside of your household that you gather with every week. If you feel symptoms of COVID-19, get tested.

  - Symptoms: Fever, Chills, Cough, Difficulty breathing, Fatigue, Muscle pain or body aches, Headache, Sore throat, Runny nose or nasal congestion, or New loss of taste or smell.
  - Asymptomatic individuals: If you are a close contact of a confirmed case, or Live in a congregate setting, like a shelter, group home or assisted living facility, or Work in a location that has had a case, Part of a family or social network that has had a case, or Work in healthcare, EMS, law enforcement or other fields where work settings have a higher risk of catching or spreading COVID-19, or Are part of a racial or ethnic group that has been disproportionately impacted by this virus in terms of rate or severity of cases (this includes people who are Black, Latinx, Native American/Alaskan Native, or Pacific Islander).
- **Extended Telecommuting:** The EOC Command Staff along with Mayor Smith have made the decision to extend employee telecommuting through the end of the first quarter of 2021.

- **CARES Act Funding:** The City of Lynnwood received \$1,782,000 in federal CARES Act Funding directly from the state Department of Commerce.
  - Recap of \$1,782,000 CARES Act Funding allocations:

▪ Payroll Costs (estimates)	\$60,000
▪ COVID-related expenses	\$208,000
▪ Business Relief Fund	\$800,000

▪ Grant to the Lynnwood Food Bank	\$50,000
  - Sub-recipient Grant from Snohomish County to Lynnwood for Small Business Grant Program: \$231,596
