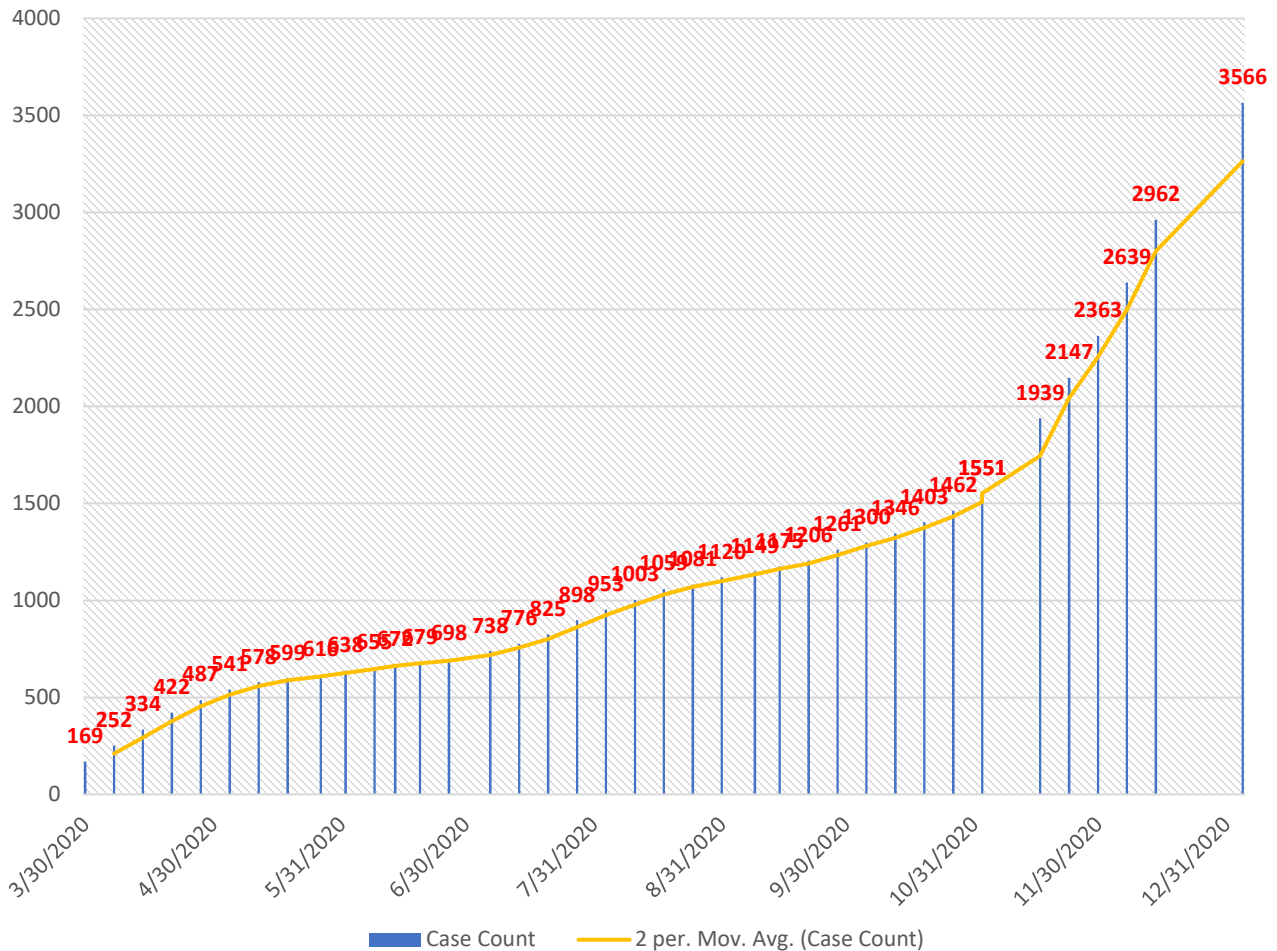
Current Statistics as of 1/04/2021:

- **Snohomish County** – 24,163 Confirmed/Probable cases (+4,478 cases from 12/14)
 - 403 Deaths (+74 from 12/14)
 - 1,625 Hospitalizations
 - 112 currently hospitalized with confirmed COVID-19, 34 suspected, 11 patients requiring ventilators

- **Washington State** – 245,381 Confirmed cases; (+41,584 from 12/14)
 - 3,459 Deaths statewide (+541 from 12/14)
 - 15,111 Hospitalizations
 - 1.4% of Deaths/Confirmed Cases

- **City of Lynnwood** – 3,566 Cases (+604 from 12/14) – 2,478 recovered
 - 34 Deaths

Lynnwood Trending

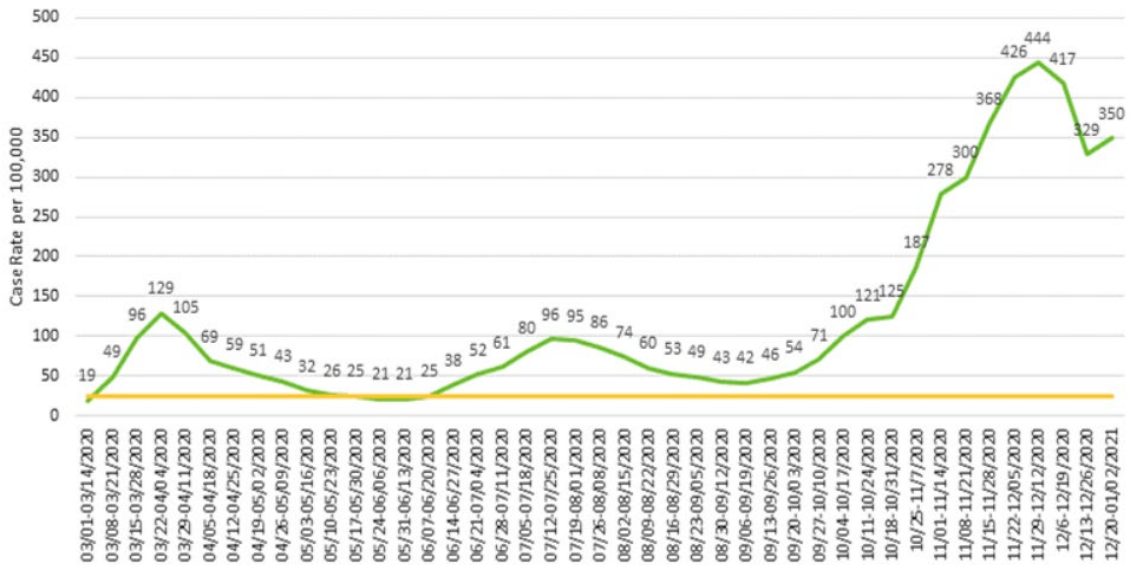

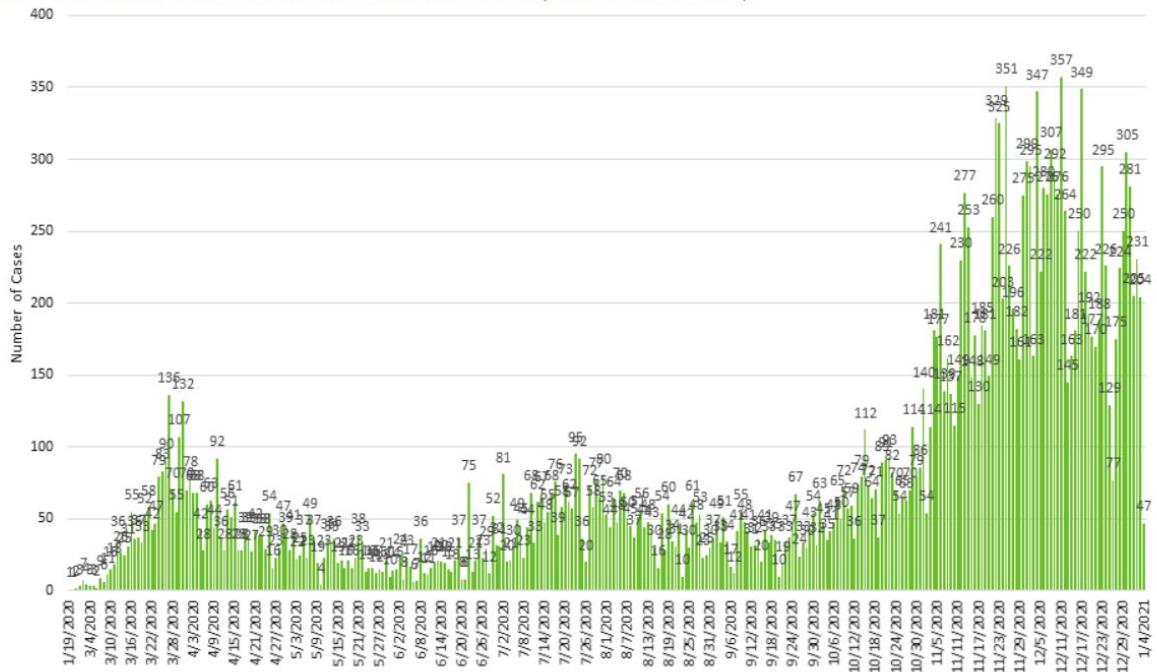
Status Update:

- COVID Case Rate Climbs Again:** This week, we are seeing and increase in case rates. This is a good reminder that we must remain vigilant in all that we are doing to help slow the spread of COVID-19. We can do better. Wear a mask. Avoid crowds and do not gather with others outside of your home. Wash your hands. Even one good choice can make a huge difference.

- COVID Restrictions:** Governor Jay Inslee has extended current COVID restrictions for an additional week, until January 11th.

- **Eviction Moratorium:** Governor Jay Inslee has extended the Eviction Moratorium through at least March 31, 2021. Additionally, he has extended the moratorium on service disconnects and late fees through April 30, 2021 for all energy, landline telephone and water utilities.
- **State reports continued progress in distributing COVID vaccines:** The Washington State Department of Health reports that it continues to make progress with COVID-19 vaccine distribution and administration efforts. DOH last week updated phase 1A guidance, with the goal of expediting vaccine administration efforts across Washington state. It followed up with a statement emphasizing the importance of rapid, well-coordinated vaccine distribution.

As of the end of December, 69,349 people in Washington had received their first dose of vaccine. As a reminder, all vaccine recipients must receive two doses of vaccine from the same manufacturer for maximum protection against COVID-19.

- **Vaccinations begin for first responders in Snohomish County:** Among the first people in Snohomish County to receive COVID-19 vaccinations are firefighters and emergency medical first responders who have been providing direct care for COVID patients. Some firefighters, including union members of the Everett and Arlington Fire Departments, took to social media over the weekend to share their experience with the first of two doses of vaccine.

- **REMINDERS**

- Staying home is still the safest. If you do go out, keep it quick, keep your distance and wear a face covering. Recreate and do business locally to avoid spreading the virus across county lines. Limit the number of people outside of your household that you gather with every week. If you feel symptoms of COVID-19, get tested.
 - **Symptoms:** Fever, Chills, Cough, Difficulty breathing, Fatigue, Muscle pain or body aches, Headache, Sore throat, Runny nose or nasal congestion, or New loss of taste or smell.
 - **Asymptomatic individuals:** If you are a close contact of a confirmed case, or Live in a congregate setting, like a shelter, group home or assisted living facility, or Work in a location that has had a case, Part of a family or social network that has had a case, or Work in healthcare, EMS, law enforcement or other fields where work settings have a higher risk of catching or spreading COVID-19, or Are part of a racial or ethnic group that has been disproportionately impacted by this virus in terms of rate or severity of cases (this includes people who are Black, Latinx, Native American/Alaskan Native, or Pacific Islander).

- **Extended Telecommuting:** The EOC Command Staff along with Mayor Smith have made the decision to extend employee telecommuting through the end of the first quarter of 2021.
