42		Director Franz explained that staff has talked with the Board about the potential of looking
43		at different means of raising revenues for transportation. The TBD has the option of
44		increasing tabs from the current \$20 up to as much as \$100 by voted measure or the increase
45		of sales tax up to an additional .2% by voted measure. At the last discussion in 2013, staff
46		agreed to reconvene the Transportation and Traffic Task Force and discuss the matter with

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them, which they have done. They have also selected consultant help to assist in a potential

outreach program for 2014. The Task Force meeting was held on October 2. Staff presented the Task Force with the materials on page 70-3 in the TBD packet and received input from them. The Task Force agreed that it is a worthwhile effort to go out and start talking to the citizens. Director Franz explained that the consultant selected by staff agreed to come and listen to that meeting to get a feel for Lynnwood and its citizens. They were very encouraged by the participation that already exists in the community as evidenced by that group.

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Project Manager Mach added that they had the Task Force members who attended the meeting do the Project Priority Questionnaire on page 70-12. They identified Pavement Management, Traffic Signal Maintenance, and Street Maintenance as the highest priorities.

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Director Franz explained that staff is still monitoring the process that is going on at the state legislature.

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Board Member Lonergan-Dreke commended staff on their outreach to the Task Force members. She spoke to the importance of lobbying state representatives about a number of issues, including transportation, and the need to change some state laws that will allow the costs of some of these projects to be reduced.

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Board Member Roberts commented on the value of outreach and getting feedback from the public.

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Board Member AuBuchon asked if anything has changed to allow the TBD to do a tab tax based on the number of axles so that the bigger trucks that tear up the road more can get taxed more. Mr. Mach said he wasn't aware of anything like that. City Attorney Larson said she also wasn't aware of anything like that. Board Member AuBuchon commented that it is quite common in other states. Project Manager Mach commented that there was a proposal for a while for a street utility that wasn't based on axle loading; it was more of a propertybased tax, and it didn't pass. Board Member AuBuchon asked if there has been any discussion about requiring licenses of commercial vehicles in the city. City Attorney Larson replied that in Washington that is a state function, not a local function.

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Board Member Roberts asked if tabs for trucks are more expensive than cars. Director Franz was not sure, but commented that the heavier the loads get, they are exponentially causing more damage to the pavement. This is one reason why Lynnwood has such beat-up arterials. 80% of CT's buses come through Lynnwood every day, and there is also a lot of freight coming through town. This takes a big toll on the roads.

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80. Consultant Contract: Community Education and Outreach

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42 43 Project Manager Mach reported that staff went through the state's procedure for selecting consultants. They advertised, received proposals, short-listed, and interviewed three firms. They ended up selecting PRR out of Seattle, Washington based on their prior experience with doing these types of public outreaches. Staff felt that PRR was very qualified to do that.

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The proposed \$60,000 scope of services includes:

- Developing informational handouts
- Conducting various community events including table events (shopping centers, library, recreation center . . .) and neighborhood open houses
- Focus group meetings
- Inside Lynnwood articles
- Conducting a statistically valid public survey including questionnaire and associated findings report (approx. \$20,000 in itself)

Board Member Roberts asked for more information about the type of survey. Project Manager Mach explained that a postcard would be mailed out to residents. Then they would have the choice of having a paper copy mailed to them or going online to fill it out in order to make it a statistically valid public survey. Director Franz said the consultant indicated that there is a possibility that a survey won't need to be done, but they won't make that decision until after they've done the outreach.

Board President Simmonds referred to the "various community events" and asked if the consultant would be using their staff or city staff. Director Franz said it would be a joint event where there would be city staff support as well as consultant support. Board President Simmonds asked how many focus group meetings they are anticipating. Project Manager Mach said they have four meetings with focus groups budgeted. They are assuming that the Task Force will be part of those meetings. If the Board would like more meetings, some of the tasks could be eliminated. He noted that there is a \$5,000 management reserve in the budget as well in case more focus groups are desired. Board President Simmonds noted that focus groups tend to be a small group of people where you can engage in in-depth conversations. He thought that four did not seem like it would be enough meetings. He then asked who would be writing the articles to be included in *Inside Lynnwood*. Project Manager Mach thought that it would be a joint venture between the consultant and staff, and possibly the Board if desired. Director Franz said it would go through the Administration. Staff would oversee the final product. Board Member Simmonds said that he hopes that the overriding influence in the article is one borne out of research by the professional in this field, and that it doesn't become a political statement. Director Franz commented that staff would come back with a more detailed plan of the scope of sequence to make sure the Board is comfortable with it.

Motion made by Board Member Boyer, seconded by Board Member Lonergan-Dreke to approve the Consultant Contract with the PRR of Seattle in the amount of \$60,000 for the purposes of providing community education and outreach services. Motion passed unanimously.

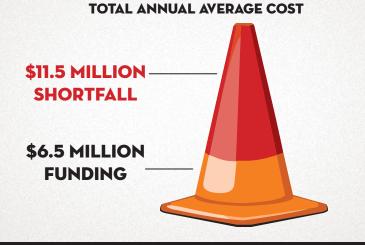

Sidewalk and Bicycle Projects

residents to travel within city limits without using their cars. The pedestrian plan calls for 104 miles of interconnecting sidewalks and walkways - 85 miles or 82% is complete today. The bicycle plan calls for 70 miles of bike lanes and routes -12 miles or 17% is complete today.
