Comments and Questions:

In addition to the input gathered as part of the brainstorming questions (attached), the following comments and questions were provided by Advisory Group members during the meeting.

- The scope of a comprehensive plan is large, and the community should think big when discussing the vision of the city for the next 20 years.
- Lynnwood should be a place that is safe for young families.
 Neighborhoods should be walkable and provide access to parks and other amenities.
- Concern that there has been a lack of resources provided for the city's most vulnerable residents. Would like to see more human services provided so that all Lynnwood residents have what they need to thrive.
- **Q:** How will the City of Lynnwood coordinate with other cities in the region during this comprehensive planning process?
 - A: The City will be using regional planning frameworks provided by the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) to guide the comprehensive planning process. In addition, Lynnwood is part of Snohomish County Tomorrow (SCT), which is a cooperative and collaborative inter-jurisdictional forum consisting of representatives from the county, cities, and Tulalip Tribes. The City will continue to look for opportunities to coordinate with other local jurisdictions.
- Q: Will engagement resources be provided in languages other the English and Spanish?
 - A: The City will be providing all major public engagement materials in English and Spanish and is also planning more targeted engagement in other languages. The City will be coordinating with community leaders to collect input from community groups and working with translators for small focus groups.
