

Meeting Notes Advisory Group Meeting 1

April 28, 2022, 4:00 pm to 5:30 pm, Via Zoom

Purpose of Meeting 1:

This was the first advisory group meeting for the City Center + Alderwood Plan. The meeting focused on introducing the planning team and process, as well as discussing the roles and responsibilities of the advisory group. The planning team presented the proposed study area context/geography and history of the City Center + Alderwood area, and we reviewed proposed elements that will be studied.

The remainder of the meeting focused on having the Advisory Group respond to a series of brainstorming questions through the online interactive program Mentimeter. The responses to these questions, attached, will help support developing a vision and guiding principles for the subarea. We also discussed our first outreach effort: Big Ideas Month in May. During the Advisory Group meeting gathered input from members about how they could support the effort. Lastly, we discussed the importance of ongoing engagement activities and the next steps in the process.

Comments and Questions:

In addition to the input gathered as part of the brainstorming activity (summary attached), the following comments and questions were provided by Advisory Group members during the meeting.

- Access to the Convention Center by public transportation is an important issue that should be studied in this project including the need for better local transit connections from the light rail station to the Convention Center and other key locations.
- There is a lack of pedestrian connectivity and concerns about the ability to walk through the CC+A subarea as a family with strollers. Sidewalks can be too narrow or nonexistent. There needs to be a better pedestrian crossing and sidewalk network.
- It is important that this Advisory Group and outreach efforts include people from diverse races, ethnicities, and cultures.
