The Street Crews are busy preparing the City's snow clearing equipment for coming snow events.

The City's two snowplows, that were named last year, "Snobi Wan Kenobi" and "Plowy McPlowface", are geared up and ready to clear city streets and apply de-icer and sand during snow events. They have their path mapped out, this can be found on the City's website https://www.LynnwoodWA.gov/StreetMaintenance. The city's highest priority is plowing and sanding major arterials so that emergency first responders (Police, Fire and Public Works) are able to get in and around the city to provide essential services and keep the city operational.

New to the City is a brine tank. With this we can make our own de-icer mix. In the past the City used a solution of CCB (calcium chloride with boost). Salt brine is less toxic to the environment and is easily made. All that is needed is rock salt, water and voila! Salt brine! The tank has a motor and a pump which mix the salt and water together to a salinity of 23.3%. Once the solution is at this ratio we fill our trucks and apply it to all of our priority routes.

At the 23.3% ratio the salt stays suspended in the water and works great for pre and post treatment of snow and ice. We will also be using this salt brine solution to prewet our aggregate materials to help prevent the bounce and scatter off the roadway.

What can the community do to help prepare for winter conditions?

Cover and wrap hose bibs in the front and back of your house to prevent freezing pipes.

Remove debris such as leaves and packed snow from storm drains. This will help alleviate drainage problems along roadways and prevent flooding or melted snow from refreezing.

After a heavy rainfall our storm drains can be overloaded; avoid driving through water on the roadways and in parking lots. The average automobile can be swept off the road in 12 inches of moving water, and attempting to drive through water may also damage your engine.

Prepare a 3-day emergency kit. Now is the time to gather emergency items such as enough food and water for your family for three days, flashlights and batteries, first-aid supplies, pet food, and other essential comfort items. For useful tips visit www.ready.gov.

Use extreme caution while driving in inclement weather of any kind. Allow plenty of time to get to your destination, always yield to service vehicles such as plows, sanders, and transit buses, and avoid driving through large amounts of water. And, if you don't have to go out when the roads are dangerous, please don't!



Please help us keep our sidewalks clear and safe this winter!

Lynnwood residents and businesses are responsible for clearing snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent and on their property. This also includes driveways, parking lots and other areas. Let's all do our part!

New Officers Ready to Serve Lynnwood

Four Lynnwood Police Officers graduated from Basic Law Enforcement Academy in August and September. With a focus on a guardian model of policing, these Officers attended a wide array of courses throughout the 720-hour academy, including legal analysis, patrol procedures, emergency driving, firearms, cultural awareness, interpersonal communication, and many other topics. They are now in the Field Training Phase, working and learning alongside a veteran officer and instructor.

The Lynnwood Police Department has four more Officers currently in Basic Law Enforcement Academy and four additional new Officers waiting for a future academy.



Council Corner: Using American Rescue Plan Act funds to make a difference in Lynnwood!

Late last year, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan Act to help states, counties and cities overcome the financial impact of the COVID pandemic. Lynnwood received \$10.9 Million! It sounds like a lot but deciding how to distribute the money has been challenging.

Your council members received over one hundred proposals from community members and have spent many hours deliberating options. Allocations made so far cover the Council's priorities of public safety, streets and parks, and community support.

Public safety is being addressed by providing \$2.6 million to fund five new police officers, body cameras for all patrol officers, a public records staff position, and a contribution to the LPD Community Health and Safety Flex Fund.

Street and park improvements include funding residential street repairs (\$2.5 million) and the construction of the Scriber Lake Park Boardwalk (\$2.0 million, matched by another \$2.0 million in state grants).

Community support has been included in the Council allocation of over \$2.0 million. Funds are going to the Lynnwood Food Bank, Heroes Café, and scholarships for low-income families to the Recreation Center programs. Contributions have been made to assist the construction of the Volunteers of America Lynnwood Community Center and a Veterans Hub. The Council has partnered with the County in matching grant programs

for Lynnwood families to be assisted by Washington Kids in Transition and a VOA Rapid Re-housing Program.

The remaining \$1.6 million is still under discussion. Funding opportunities include a mentorship program for marginalized students, a Human Services Coordinator to help community members access needed resources, a Behavioral Health program for Lynnwood schools and a Shop Lynnwood program.

Future Lynnwood City Center

The future downtown of Lynnwood, known as City Center, has welcomed new neighbors and infrastructure upgrades over the last year. The progress made in 2022 will continue over the next few years as we anticipate Link light rail's opening bringing new businesses and housing options to the area.

Early this year, **Kinect @ Lynnwood Apartments** on Alderwood Mall Boulevard opened its doors to hundreds of new residents and community members. This project brought mixed-income housing opportunities to the area and was the first project under the City's revised design standards.

A few weeks later, substantial construction on **Ember Apartments** began at the corner of 40th Avenue West and 198th Street SW. This project plans to bring more mixed-income housing and approximately 9,000 square feet of new commercial space. This project will anchor the long-time vision of creating 198th Street as the main street of downtown. The "Promenade" will connect residents and retail to the transit center and other destinations.

The 196th Street Widening project has continued to implement new sidewalks and utilities, creating additional lanes for business and transit services. This project will be completed in 2023, but we can already see how much better the corridor will look!

Town Square Park is coming to City Center! In October, the City acquired property at 4027 198th Street SW to construct our public gathering space in the heart of our future downtown. This was a momentous step forward in demonstrating the commitment to the vision of the City Center.

The **Northline Village** project has continued to build momentum for its Phase 1 development. The developer, Merlone Geier Partners, recently finalized utility configurations to prepare the construction site. The

City is currently meeting with the housing partner on permitting and design requirements.

Sound Transit has continued construction of the **Lynnwood City Center light rail station.** They have nearly completed the construction of the new parking garage, which will contain 1,670 parking spaces. This project continues to come to life and will bring new light rail service to Lynnwood in only a few short years.

Sound Transit has also coordinated the final design of an additional transit improvement for the **widening** of 200th Street SW. This will include new lanes and improved signal operations at 200th and 44th intersections. This project anticipates being under construction in 2023.

Our new **42nd Avenue West design** has continued, focusing on pedestrian access to our City Center Promenade. When complete, this grid street will provide additional connectivity that allows pedestrians and motorists more options to connect to our destinations.

MAJOR PROJECTS

196th Improvement Project

A new traffic signal has been installed at 48th Ave W & 196th St SW and the new signal at 44th Ave W & 196th St SW is being installed as this edition is being printed.

The 196th St SW Improvement Project is progressing. A major channelization has now occurred as the majority of sidewalk, streetlights, and utilities have been completed.

Please continue to adhere to the 30 mph or less speed limit through the construction corridor.

During the upcoming months you can expect roadway excavation, installation of new traffic signals, property restoration, concrete work on sidewalks and driveways.

The businesses along 196th are still open! Access to them may require a different route, as there are no left turns aloud through the construction corridor.

2022 Pavement Program

This year's Pavement Program focused efforts on 176th Street SW, between 44th Ave W and 52nd Ave W. This work has included repaving the road, repairing sidewalks, and adding crosswalks.

2022 ADA Ramps and Sidewalks

Blueridge Drive has been the focus of this year's ADA Ramps and Sidewalks emphasis. A total of twelve sidewalk ramps are being brought up to ADA standards, increasing safety and accessibility.

Intersection Improvement Priority Project

The City of Lynnwood recently completed an intersection safety study. This study identified high collision intersections and made recommendations to improve traffic safety.

These recommendations will help guide the Traffic Department to plan for changes of these identified intersections. These changes will improve safety, reduce collisions, and increase safe travel for pedestrians and bicyclists.

Left Turn Collision Statistics

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA), almost half of the 6 million auto collisions that occur each year are "intersectionrelated" and that the majority of these are left turns.

NHTSA also estimates approximately, 22% of all car collisions involve a left-turning vehicle and 53% of all cross-path collisions are the result of left turns, whereas less than 6% of the crashes involve right turns.* That is nearly ten times more collisions involving left turn verses right turn.

Left turning vehicle also contribute to angle and head on collisions which have more severity than right turning sideswipe or rear to side collision.
