

Creating a Veteran-Supportive City

Starting in 2015, Mayor Smith and the City Council made a commitment to embark on a Veterans Initiative and make Lynnwood a Veteran-Support City. Through great partnerships, here's a look at what we've been able to accomplish so far:

- **Veteran Services Roundtable:** A diverse group of service providers gathered to collaborate, share resources, and figure out a way to provide better services to our nation's heroes.
- Veterans One-Stop Resource Center: Opened in early 2016, the center is staffed by local professionals available to assist with referrals to Veterans Affairs, medical and employment assistance, career transitions, and more. Open every Tuesday and the 1st Wednesday of each month from 9:00am to 3:00pm at the Verdant Wellness Center.
- Hero's Café: a monthly gathering for veterans to focus on fostering positive outreach, interaction, and welfare within our community. Open the last Tuesday of each month from 9am-3pm at the Verdant Wellness Center.
- **Sebastian Place Partnership**: The City and the Lynnwood Rotary provided home furnishings for the 20-unit apartment building for homeless veterans.
- Korean War Veterans Memorial Ceremony: Hosted in partnership with Edmonds Community College, Lynnwood's Sister Cities Association, the Korean Consulate General, Mr. Moon Duk Ho and WA State Representative Cindy Ryu.
- Northwest Veterans Museum at Heritage Park: The museum will be a place
 for community members and veterans to share history, stories, and meet each
 other. Rotating historic artifacts and displays will be featured in the Museum.

As these grass root efforts continue to grow, it is with great pride and honor to say that—yes—Lynnwood is a Veteran-Supportive city where our nation's heroes can live, work, educate, recreate—and thrive!

Safe & Welcoming City



On January 23, we adopted a Safe and Welcoming City Resolution. In that resolution, I was joined by the City Council and Chief of Police Tom Davis in a commitment to make Lynnwood a safe, welcoming, and equitable community for everyone. In that resolution we also made a commitment to stand together with the people of Lynnwood in opposing hate, violence, and acts of intolerance

committed against our community members. All members of our community that choose to live here peacefully, deserve to feel safe and secure in their community - at home, work, school, and places of worship.

We have made intentional progress towards removing barriers and promoting a pro-equity way of doing business. We have established a new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion volunteer commission that will help advise the City on ways to promote equity and build trusting relationships with our diverse community. We are enhancing our employees' cultural competencies through a variety of trainings and experiences, examining the way we communicate and reach out to community members, and we are reviewing our city policies and procedures.

Our Lynnwood Police Department has made great efforts to focus on community-oriented policing. Last September we launched the Communities of Color and Police Relations Taskforce. That group is tasked with providing advice on city policies to promote equity, ensure trust and transparency, and identify ways the city can proactively listen and engage with all members of our community. Our Police Department has also recently launched a new program called Cops and Clergy which aims to build open and trusting relationships between our officers and our faith and religious leaders.

These are just a few examples of how we are 'walking the talk' of being a safe and welcoming city. We want all people of Lynnwood to feel safe, be engaged, participate, have access to City service, and contribute to our efforts of making Lynnwood a place that we can all be proud to call home!

Volunteers Make a Difference

Global Peace Foundation along with Cub Scout Pack 331 and other community volunteers helped to make MLK Day of Service a fantastic success! The volunteers successfully spread 50 cubic yards of recycled wood chips throughout Lynndale Park, covering 5,000 square feet of tree rings and informal beds. This work will help to reduce weeds and conserve water throughout the year. Volunteers also cleared and cleaned up 10 yards of English Ivy growing up several trees throughout the park.

We have a wonderful Parks Maintenance crew that work hard to keep things in top condition, but we can't do it alone. In fact, each year teams of dedicated volunteers contribute many hours to help maintain and improve our parks and trails system.

If you are interested in getting involved, the Park Volunteer Service Program offers a variety of ways you can help Lynnwood's parks. Volunteers can: remove invasive plants, clear debris from trails, add surfacing such as crushed rock, mulch or bark, cut back vegetation from encroaching on trails, maintain flower beds, clean graffiti, pick up litter, repaint benches, picnic tables and wood signs, and much more!

You can join an upcoming work party, identify your own group work party, or Adopt-a-Trail. Tools, gloves and equipment are provided. All ages are welcome to participate.



Regional Fire Service

To create a balanced and sustainable budget, it may be necessary to streamline, reinvent, or even divest in certain areas. Some residents argue for lower taxes while others ask for new or expanded City services, and City leaders work hard to balance diverse community input with fiscal realities.

Like many other cities across our nation, Lynnwood is faced with rising costs of providing services and diminishing resources. One of the goals outlined in the 2017-2018 budget process was to address long-term financial sustainability. The Lynnwood Fire Department has experienced a dramatic increase in calls for service over the last several years, and with the expected growth of the City, calls for service will increase even more. Lynnwood and Fire District 1 have formed a Regional Fire Authority (RFA) Planning Committee, comprised of 3 elected officials from each agency, to review how regionalization could provide for greater control over rising costs, and provide a more sustainable and effective fire service for our growing community.

The RFA Planning Committee is working to create a plan that will be presented to Lynnwood and Fire District 1 voters which will include information on how the new RFA will be governed, financed, and operated. The RFA Planning Committee will be delivering the plan to both the Lynnwood City Council and Fire District 1 Board of Commissioners in late April. If both agencies decide to move forward with the RFA Plan, area voters can expect to see this issue on their August 2017 ballot.

Without regionalization, the City of Lynnwood will need to determine how to fund millions of dollars for additional resources to our City fire department without jeopardizing other city services. We must take a critical look at our City services to ensure that we are leveraging every tax dollar to achieve maximum results. This thoughtful and thorough examination of our city services will help us to create a financially resilient community that propels us toward achieving our community vision of being "a regional model for a sustainable, vibrant community with engaged citizens and an accountable government."

Council Corner: Human Services

Supporting our underserved and underrepresented community members

Lynnwood's Community Vision calls for a cohesive community that respects all residents and states that Lynnwood will be α city that is responsive to the wants and needs of our residents. In order to better address the needs of Lynnwood's lower income residents, the homeless, seniors, veterans, victims of abuse, youth and others that are typically underserved - our City created a new Human Services Commission.

The Human Services Commission is an advisory body to the City Council and City Administration. The City is fortunate to have seven individuals who are committed to supporting our underserved and underrepresented community members.

The Human Services Commission recently conducted a needs assessment and identified the top areas of concern as: basic needs such as shelter, food, and clothing; homelessness; substance abuse; mental illness; and support for Veterans. The work of the Commission encourages partnerships and collaboration between City Departments, such as Community

Development, Police, Fire, and Parks. We also partner with service providers from non-profits agencies, the faith community and government agencies to enhancement our community's response to complex social issues.

Last year, the City adopted a Human Services Element to the Comprehensive Plan to further enhance our commitment to serving our vulnerable community members. We continue to work with the YWCA to provide a Homeless Engagement Liaison who works closely with our Community Health and Safety Section of the Police Department. And later this year the City will be seeking proposals to further expand services to those most in need.

2017 Legislative Priorities

The City of Lynnwood has developed the following Legislative Priorities for 2017. These legislative priorities allow our elected officials and city leadership to efficiently and effectively convey our City's top priorities to our State Legislators and Senators. Many decisions that are made in Olympia have direct or indirect impacts on our City's ability to provide services to the people of Lynnwood. When our representatives know our City priorities, they are better equipped to represent our interests in Olympia!

Economic Development

- Fund the state sales tax incentive and re-establish programs to support large scale annexations consistent with the Growth Management Act and the efficient provision of city services. Lynnwood continues to review annexation opportunities of up to 30,000 people.
- Provide local government with financing tools to fund public infrastructure needed for economic development and community revitalization.
- Retain full funding for Associated Development
 Organizations such as the Economic Alliance Snohomish
 County, a catalyst for economic vitality and building strong
 partnerships with local communities.
- Extend the taxing authority of Public Facilities Districts for 15 years, to allow these valuable community assets to address their capital and operational needs.
- Support passage of the Tourism Marketing Act.
- Provide capital and program funding for a new STEM building at Edmonds Community College.

Fiscal Sustainability

• Protect the level of state shared revenues provided to local governments.

Housing, Human Services & Health

- Support efforts to address mental health, homelessness and affordable housing.
- Provide additional resources for mental health and chemical dependency programs, and create local options to generate revenue that address affordable housing and homelessness via the Housing Trust Fund and raising the document recording fee.
- Re-establish equitable funding for local public health districts that has diminished since the repeal of the motor vehicle excise tax in 2000. Public health services, including responding to communicable diseases and immunization of vulnerable populations, are essential and fundamental functions of responsible government.
- Support raising the state minimum age of sale for all tobacco products to 21-years old.

Transportation & Infrastructure

- Improve and expand transportation programs through state or federal funding grants.
- Protect and increase the Public Works Trust Fund.
- Expand the use of design-build and general contractor/ manager (GC/CM) contracting procedures for cities to achieve greater efficiencies in local capital project implementation.
- Enhance local funding options to provide diverse revenue sources for infrastructure operations, preservation and capital needs.
- Support planning and funding solutions for chokepoint and congestion relief in alignment with transportation priorities of Lynnwood and the region



Lynnwood is committed to Washington's economic prosperity and is a regional center for business and commerce – ranking in the top 10 cities statewide generating millions of dollars annually in taxable retail sales and trade. The retail sector forms the second largest employment base in the city, which includes more than 3,200 businesses of which over 200 are Korean-owned businesses. An important fact to note is that we have started to explore a journey of economic, educational and cultural exchanges internationally with our new Sister City relationship with Damyang, South Korea.

Public Safety and Emergency Responsiveness

- Increase state funding for law enforcement training academies to support local public safety needs.
- Continue funding public safety programs such as victim notification, sex offender verification and auto theft prevention.
- Support the mobilization of "all risk resources" during an emergency, to improve emergency management, coordinate responses, and enhance communications.
- Fund training and specialized equipment to meet the emergency service demands from natural disasters.

Statewide Acts

- Strengthen the Public Records Act in response to changing technology by giving cities more flexibility to address the increase of egregious public record requests.
- Support the False Claims Act and empower public contracting agencies with stronger rights and protection against false claims.

U.S. Congress

The City of Lynnwood echoes the Association of Washington Cities (AWC) push that federal fiscal policies should enhance the ability of local elected officials to respond to needs at the local level. Lynnwood and other cities rely on federal funding to build infrastructure, support economic development, deliver human services, and ensure public safety. With sufficient federal funds, we can demonstrate a substantial return on investment. This funding must be consistent, stable, and reliable. We also echo AWC's position to oppose federal policies that undermine local government regulatory authority, impose unfunded mandates, or preempt local government revenues and revenue authorities.

Lynnwood & other Washington cities need Congress to:

- · Close the online sales tax loophole
- · Protect municipal bonds
- · Invest in infrastructure
- · Maintain community development funding
- Ensure safe communities



Lynnwood is focused on meeting the basic needs and services for individuals and families, addressing homelessness, seniors, veterans, youth, and those underserved, under the guidance and responsibility of a seven-member Human Services Commission established early 2016.



Lynnwood takes great honor in ensuring the public safety of all people in the city. Our professional firefighters and police officers are highly trained, well-educated, extremely motivated, and focused on the core mission of service to the community. We have a robust Emergency Operations Center that can be activated in times of emergency, led by the Lynnwood Fire Department. And with a vision to be a cohesive community that respects all people in such a diverse city, the Lynnwood Police Department is leading a charge of discussions called "Communities of Color and Police Relations."



Lynnwood is a regional transportation and transit center serving the north Puget Sound area. We are one of only three cities in the country to receive a 2016 grant from the Federal Transit Administration to explore transit-oriented development in preparation for Sound Transit Lynnwood Link Light Rail in 2023, which is projected to be one of the busiest stations. And with the recent passage of the Transportation Package by the Washington State Legislature, Lynnwood will receive a state grant for the 196th Street SW project (pictured above) that will add additional lanes, median barriers, wider sidewalks and landscaping making the area safer and more attractive.


