Message from Mayor Nicola Smith

Where Do Your Tax Dollars Go?



City services are funded by several different funding streams; however, the largest portion comes from sales tax and property tax. If you are a property owner, you pay your property taxes twice a year. If you are a consumer, you pay sales tax on just about every purchase you make. But do you know where those tax dollars go?

The City of Lynnwood is a full-service city that provides essential services

such as police, fire and emergency medical, road maintenance, waste water treatment, and financial management, to name a few. Other important services we provide include planning and development, economic development, and parks maintenance. Funding these critical city services is dependent on how much property tax and sales tax we receive each year. The graphics to the right show you a breakdown of where exactly your tax dollars are distributed, and how much goes to whom.


Last November, voters in King and Snohomish County passed the Sound Transit 3 initiative, which approved a mixture of increases to property tax, sales tax, and car tab fees. This initiative will directly impact Lynnwood by taking Sound Transit 2 from the Lynnwood Transit Center, to another stop in Lynnwood and then continue north to Everett. The approval of ST3 added 0.5% to Lynnwood's sales tax rate. Voters in the City of Lynnwood also approved a Transportation Benefit District (TBD) which added 0.1% to Lynnwood's sales tax rate. What's great about the TBD is that we anticipate it will raise approximately \$2 million per year that will be invested directly into our city by way of road maintenance, chip seal, and capital projects such as the 36th Ave W project.

These dollar bill graphics are a great tool to better understand what portion of your sales taxes and property taxes go to our City. The majority of your property tax dollars (64.3 cents) goes to fund public schools. Our City only keeps 16.4 cents for every \$1.00 in property tax, plus an additional 3.8 cents for every \$1.00 for emergency medical services (EMS levy). For sales tax, we only receive 9.6 cents for every \$1.00 and now an additional penny goes towards road maintenance and capital improvements through the voter-approved Transportation Benefit District.

Council Corner: Engaged Citizens

A guide to citizen involvement at City Council meetings

The City of Lynnwood's community vision calls for engaged citizens. One of the best ways to do this is to come to a City Council meeting and speak to the Council. This is not as daunting as it sounds and here are a few hints on what to do and what to expect.

Every second and fourth Monday the Council holds Business Meetings and there is always time set aside for Citizen Comments. Before you enter the Council Chambers at City Hall, there is a table right under the wall of photos of the Council members. On that table, you will find an agenda for the night's meeting for you to take. There will also be a sign-up sheet for anyone who wants to give a Public Comment. Some meetings will have more than one sheet if there is a public hearing. Those who want to speak at the public hearing sign up on that sheet. In either case, if you do not sign up before the meeting, the Mayor will call on those who have signed in first, but she will ask if there is anyone else who wishes to speak, and you can raise your hand and be called on.

When you talk to the Council you will come to the podium, give your name and address and then you have three minutes to speak to the Council. Please remember that these meetings are recorded and will be televised. There are a few rules that need to be followed while you talk. Remarks should be addressed to the Council as a whole, no personal remarks to one Council member and of course nothing abusive. There is one thing that may seem awkward while you speak from the podium: by Council rule, Council Members cannot respond as you talk to them. This is not supposed to be a debate, it is your time to share your thoughts, and we listen. A lot of citizens leave after they speak but it is better to wait for the Council break. At that time, if you want, you can have a one-on-one conversation with Council members.

The City Council wants everyone to attend as many Council meetings as possible. We want to know what you think about your City! So please join us every second and fourth Monday at 7PM and let us know how we are doing in representing the residents of Lynnwood.

Water Quality Report

The City of Lynnwood's Consumer Confidence Report (Water Quality Report) is now available to customers online and at City Hall.

The Annual Water Quality Report is a performance measure of the quality of water supplied by the City of



Lynnwood. The report describes local drinking water sources, testing conducted on the water, allowable limits of substances, substances detected, and the levels of those substances.

Regional Fire Service

On April 24, the Lynnwood City Council approved a joint resolution and on May 2, the Snohomish County Fire District 1 Commissioners approved the same joint resolution, effectively placing the South Snohomish County Fire & Rescue Regional Fire Authority Plan on the August 1, 2017 election ballot.

A Regional Fire Authority (RFA) is a special purpose district created by a vote of the people. State law provides the framework for cities and fire districts to consider forming an RFA.

Last fall, in accordance with this state law, Fire District 1 and the City of Lynnwood formed the RFA Planning Committee consisting of three elected officials from each entity. The Committee has been meeting regularly since October 2016 to develop an RFA Plan to present to area voters.

If approved by voters, the RFA Plan would specify, among other provisions:

- RFA Name: South Snohomish County Fire & Rescue
- RFA Start Date: October 1, 2017
- Governing Board: Initially, a transition board will govern the new RFA. The transition board will have seven members, consisting of the five seated Fire District I commissioners and two seated elected City officials to be appointed by the City Council. The permanent RFA governing board will be comprised of seven elected commissioners; five will be elected from distinct geographic districts within the RFA service area, and two will be elected at-large. The transition board will establish the boundaries of the five districts prior to the 2019 election, and the five district commissioners will be elected at that election. The

population of each district shall be relatively equal and two districts shall include portions of the City. The two at-large commissioner positions will be elected in the 2021 election cycle.

- Service Levels: On the RFA start date, the RFA will
 provide the same services and levels of service
 as the City within the City's former service area
 and as Fire District 1 within the District's former
 service area.
- Fire Stations, Vehicles & Equipment: All fire stations, vehicles and equipment from both the Lynnwood Fire Department and Fire District 1 will transfer to the new RFA.
- Staffing: On the RFA start date, all current fire staff from the City and Fire District (Fire, EMS, and Professional Staff) will become employees of the RFA.
- Tax Levy Authority: The RFA will be a new taxing district with authority to levy a property tax levy of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value beginning in 2018. If the voters approve the creation of the RFA and the RFA Plan, the City and Fire District property tax levy capacities will be reduced to offset the new taxing district levy. Through the mid-biennial budget process in the fall of 2017, the Lynnwood City Council will determine the amount of the City's property tax levy, taking into account the cost savings of not having the Lynnwood Fire Department funded through the City's general fund. The public will be asked to participate in these discussions this fall.
